Professor of Functional Plant Anatomy and Morphology since 2004, Department of Biology, University of Patras, Greece.

Research: in the field of Functional plant anatomy.

Methodology: Light, epi-fluorescence and electron microscopy/microanalysis.

Teaching: Plant Anatomy and Morphology, Plant Physiology.

As AvHumboldt fellowship I carried out research at the Institut für Botanik und Pharmazeutische Biologie of the University Erlangen – Nürnberg (1987-1988). I made a scientific film at the IWF Goettingen. Later I was working at the Institut Biologie II/ Botanik, of the University Freiburg (1994) and again as AvH fellowship in Wuerzburg (2005).

3. What's your image from India? Do you have any experiences with the cultural differences of your home country and India? What do you find most fascinating about it? Do you have any experience regarding a scientific or economic exchange between India and the European Union?

I visited India attending a Humbold Kollogium (2006). No doubt, there are significant differences in the culture of our countries. But what we noticed was the hospitality of the people and the feeling of safety we had in India.

Although bureaucracy seems to dominate elsewhere, we got the impression that in Academia the right people were in the right positions.
